Efforts to provide proper tidal exchange within the lower estuary have come into conflict with needs to limit upstream impacts from saltwater inundation. This grant application will support the purchase and restoration of the last remaining unrestored 35 acre parcel within the tidal zone and construct the control structure described in the Moro Cojo Management and Enhancement Plan to protect freshwater habitat and species in the upper slough from saltwater impacts. The Agency has participated in the planning and implementation of many of the previous restoration projects, and is prepared to aid the completion of the final efforts outlined within this project.

The Agency is fully committed to managing the downstream tide gates to provide the optimal hydraulic conditions for special status species and is partnering with CCWG to obtain the necessary resources to construct the necessary weir to allow adaptive management of this system. Without this

Please accept this letter of support for the proposal titled "Implementation of key actions" the Moro Cojo Slough Enhancement Plan". Since 1996 the Central Coast Wetland Group has been working we at the agriculture community to implement the Moro Cojo Enhancement and Management Plan. As of 2015, CCWG and its partners have implemented (or are currently constructing) most of the key projects outlined within the plan. Recent y however, failure of the Moro Cojo tide gates has led to flooding of the brackish and freshwater portions of the estuary with saltwater. This event has impacted estuarine habitat, threatened established communities of threatened and endangered species, and flooded adjacent farm operations. The funding outlined in this application is needed immediately to help address these environmental impacts and implement restoration and adaptation measures (weir structure) necessary to protect wetland habitat, endangered species, flatfish fisheries and adjacent farmland.

This grant application will support the community's efforts to acquire the last parcel of degraded tidal marsh, restore that parcel, install a control weir to protect freshwater habitat from marine impacts and complete the final key tasks outlined in the Enhancement plan (all actions prioritized by the 2013 TAC meeting).

Without this financial support, the community does not have the resources necessary to adequately protect the resources of this Marine Managed Area (Moro Cojo Slough SMR) and adjacent fresh water habitat already impacted by the recent tide gate failure.

Funding is needed now to address these resource management issues.
